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WASP Golf Tournament

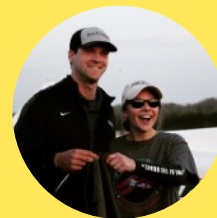
The upcoming 2nd annual WASP golf tournament at Kingsmill Resort will be held June 30th, 2018
